






Thank you for joining us for the closing of The Bancroft Library exhibition, *California Captured* on Canvas. This event attracted more than two hundred attendees. Many of you who were seeing The Bancroft Library for the first time, and what an amazing display you encountered!

The Bancroft Gallery, with its handsomely displayed selection of paintings from Bancroft's enormous pictorial collection, showcased one of the unexpected treasures of California's oldest and largest library devoted to the history of California and the American West. The variety of styles, eras, and approaches to documenting California in image attested to the great visual appeal of our favorite state. Throughout the gallery, landscapes, portraits, and other paintings captured a sense of California from the time of the California Gold Rush right up to the early 1960s, when John Sackas created a suite of oil paintings of San Francisco's wholesale produce district (that was soon to be replaced by the Embacradero Center).

You also had the opportunity to view other major treasures from Bancroft's collections. Curators from the Mark Twain Papers, the University Archives, the Bancroft Collections of Western Americana and Latin Americana, the Rare Books Collection, the Center for Tebtunis Papyri, the Magnes Collection of Jewish Art and Life, and more, selected some of their favorite things for a special display, where the curators greeted guess and talked about items they had selected to show off the incredibly rich research resources of The Bancroft Library.

These collections are here for use not only by academic scholars but also by members of the general public. Indeed Bancroft has what we believe to be the busiest reading room in North America devoted to rare books, manuscripts, and other special collections. Our readers arrive from all over the world and frequently comment about the enthusiasm of the staff for the collections, and the strong support Bancrofters provide to users. The collections and programs at Bancroft are strong because of the long-standing generosity of private individuals, such as the Friends of The Bancroft Library. For all of us it is a great privilege to be able to celebrate the continuing support of the Bancroft community by showcasing, as we did on Sunday, March 8, the strengths of this remarkable institution.

Bancroft Library's stunning California Captured on Canvas exhibit

An exhibit at UC Berkeley's Bancroft Library features a spectracular pieces selected from the library's collection of 300-bits of paintings highlighting the state's unique history and culture. The paintings in the exhibit depict the art, commerce, geography and characters that have drawn people to California since its early days, (The exhibit video at inyut.com/queoppr portrays highlights from the show, accompanied by commentary from curator Jack von Euw.)

Von Euw heads the Bancroft's pictorial collection, which is second only to that of the Library of Congress and contains more than 8 million photos, drawings and paintings. He assembled the exhibit to visually tell the Golden State's story, from colonial exploration to the Gold Rush and more.

The show includes a colorful and striking portrait of Helen Wills, a UCB Beheley alumna who won eight Wimbledon titles and was the founding benefactor of the campus's thriving Helen Wills Neuroscience Center. Three's a mesmetrizing collection of paintings of Yosemite Valley in the early days of its septoration that reflect the valley's continuing ability to inspire and awe. Another series of paintings shows San Prancisco's Chinatown before the city's deexasting yoof ceathquake.




